Mind over Matter A Panel Discussion with Soror Daya Fields South Atlantic Regional Conference April 17, 2021

Choosing options for workshops at Regionals is always hard. There are so many worthwhile workshops. However, the panel discussion by Soror, Innovator, Entrepreneur, and Creator Daya Fields was unexpectedly refreshing. Soror Daya is the President of Pipette and Purecane. Both businesses were founded and created with the intentional impact of the African American community. Her products are environmentally conscious and scientifically sound.

While the panel moderator did a great job touting Soror Daya's resume, Soror Daya quickly steered the conversation to the attendees. She was interested in our mental health navigating through the COVID-19 pandemic. She implored us to take time out for ourselves. Soror Daya mentioned that true self-care includes rest, relaxation, reflection, creating alone time, and healthcare. Mothers were reminded to create time in every day for themselves and that we should learn to be early risers to optimize and ensure that we receive that time-out daily. While the panel was an amazing reminder to think about ourselves first, she also gave attendees tips on rising the corporate ladder, becoming an entrepreneur, developing our network, and utilizing social media platforms such as Linkedin.

Soror Daya finished the workshop by sharing her thoughts on generational wealth. She encouraged all Sorors on the benefits generational wealth will bring to our community. She shared a quote from Gandhi, "the future depends on what you do today".

I have been moved deeply by this workshop. I have begun to implement the tools learned in this workshop in my home life and professional environment. Freedom is having options without restraint. That sentence spoken by Soror Daya resonated through my spirit. I was blessed to be a part and I am forever impacted by my attendance.

Soror Andria S. Daniels, South Atlantic Representative to the International Program Committee delivered the Program Exemplifying Excellence through Sustainable Service workshop. This workshop provided a review of the Excellence program to date by Target and shared ideas on how chapters implemented virtual program activities during the pandemic.

Soror Daniels reviewed each of the South Atlantic Region's Program goals and reported that we have exceeded ALL OF OUR GOALS including pillowcase shirts even during the pandemic!

Pandemic Guidelines for in person events were reviewed thoroughly including the form that must be submitted to and approved by Madame Regional Directory before hosting in-person events.

Soror Daniels closed out the workshop by providing activity recommendations for each Target as we continue service in a virtual environment.

Session/Workshop: Membership Intake Process (MIP)

The Membership Intake session was basically the same as the "Revised" MIP session held for grad advisors, undergrad basilei, and membership chairmen.

There were many questions/comments about limiting the number of people who could attend the final ceremony and NOT having the luncheon. All were reminded of the potential risks, and it was reiterated that AKA would not be having in-person events such as meetings, luncheons until further notice. Service projects that receive prior approval may be held face-to-face with certain restrictions or limitations.

Chapters who had completed the virtual MIP or were in the process were allowed to share some pros/cons, ah ha moments, and potential landmines to avoid.

Connection:

2020 focused on Census 2020 completion and voter engagement and mobilization with a pivot toward solutions to overcome the pandemic. Under the GOTV (Get Out the Vote) banner and AKAs L.E.A.D. the committee encouraged sorors chapters to have voter couch parties and virtual Census parties. During the summer of 2020 over 16,000 sorors participated in the Poor People's Campaign Virtual March. In the fall the committee released a 100 day GOTV strategy guide which provided recommended virtual activities designed to educate and engage voters ahead of the 2020 general election. AKAs L.E.A.D. 3.0 is on track to encourage chapters to advance the advocacy agenda.

Disaster Relief:

This is a newly created committee which has been active for two years. It was established to focus on identifying and assisting sorors who are adversely affected by disasters. The committee published the International Disaster Relief Chapter Guide which is available for sale and on line. The document is designed to help chapters how to think through the best ways to best respond to a disaster as well as know what local protocols should be observed. Workshops were facilitated at Leadership Seminar in 2019 and at Regional Conferences in 2019. The committee is continuously available to support ad hoc regional and international requests. The greatest success of the committee is the ability to mobilize quickly around disasters as they happen and work collaboratively with Regional Directors and Corporate Office to catalogue the impact to sorors and provide financial assistance on behalf of the Sorority. Over 200 sorors have been assisted by this committee impacted by – Hurricane Florence September 2018, Hurricane Michael October 2018, California Wildfires 2018, Ohio Tornado Outbreak May 2019, Hurricane Dorian September 2019, Nashville, TN tornadoes March 2020, Mississippi Tornadoes April 2020, Hurricane Laura August 2020, Hurricane Delta September 2020, Southeastern Tornado Outbreak Fall 2020 and California Bobcat Wildfires 2020. The ongoing impact of the COVID-19 pandemic has also been monitored since it began in January 2020. Plans for 2021 include enhancement of the Disaster Relief Guide to include information on preparing for a pandemic and how to retain resiliency during difficult times. Observance of Disaster Preparedness Month in September 2021 and collaboration with the American Red Cross.

Membership:

The mission is to monitor membership strategies and trends, recommend strategies for recruitment, retention and reactivation of members and develop, cultivate, communicate and evaluate systems that maintain and support lifelong active membership. The committee delivered sustainable solutions to enhance sorors' membership experience through innovative virtual platforms. The slogan and logo created to convey the message that all members are valuable and necessary was Membership is Pearlfection: You Belong Here. The committee collaborated with Technology, DPGS, Program, Sisterly Relations, MIP, Graduate Advisor Certification and Reinstatement committees along with Corporate office staff to advance the Membership program Reactivation Workplace. Through the committees efforts over 23,000 sorors have been reactivated since instituting Reactivation Workplace. More than 500 chapters have been recognized as the Best of the Best for supporting reactivation excellence. The committee established the Online Membership Directory, the Membership Business Directory, online transfer verification process, electronic end of year report #8. In 2021 a Soror Retention Survey instrument is planned as well as a Membership

Data Visualization Plan. Chapters receiving the designation of 2020-2021 Best of the Best recognition submitted the online Membership end of year report by December 31st, reported at least one virtual reactivation activity in 2020 and reactivated at least one soror in 2020 based on Corporate Office reactivation data. There are 104 SAR chapters that met those requirements. Lambda Epsilon Omega is one of the 2020-2021 "Best of the Best". The chapter with the highest number of reactivations was Nu Lambda Omega and was recognized as the Reactivation Day Winner for reactivating 52 sorors. During the 2021 Reactivation Day Five K – A Race to the Finish Campaign the goal of 5,000 was exceeded with over 12,000 sorors reactivated during the campaign.

MIP:

Effective March 7, 2020 the Supreme Basileus directed that all MIP be postponed due to the global pandemic and no MIP were conducted during the fall of 2020. A new strategic plan was developed for the Membership Intake Process that accommodates CDC guidelines and guidance from local authorities due to the pandemic. The sorority's electronic computer platform capabilities were reviewed to determine changes needed during a pandemic, workshop training modules were standardized within the schedule at a glance that are consistent and informative with standard powerpoint presentations and scripts to be made available on the sorority's website. Activities which cannot be completed due to the pandemic e.g., service projects and attendance requirements, were identified; and conduct four training sessions globally on conducting an MIP in a pandemic environment was developed for MIP chairmen. MIP committee, Chapter Basilli, graduate advisors and financial officers. These four trainings will be conducted regionally. A new 2021 Modified MIP Manual has been developed for implementing 2021 MIPs in the Spring. The Strategic Road Map Tool Update developed during the pandemic will allow Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. to plan, prepare and push forward with more MIPs in the near future. With these processes in place 80 undergraduate chapters conducted MIPs with 1055 new members completing the virtual MIP.

Standards:

Published the initial How to Conduct an Effective Virtual Meeting Guide. Expanded the virtual guide to The Pandemic Guide to Virtual Operations. Electronic chapter evaluations have resumed and will continue during this administration. Several regions achieved a 100% submission rate.

Evaluations were received at the end of the conference.

Program Report from Soror Andrea Daniels

- #CAP SAR chapters enrolled 21,472 students with 1480 students accepted to college
- Over \$1.4 million in chapter HBCU scholarships were awarded and 141 chapters adopted an HBCU
- Over 17,000 sorors are graduates of an HBCU and nearly 7,200 are active members of their alumni associations
- Nearly 400 financial planning programs have been offered with over 600 individuals and families benefiting from Operations AKA Assist activities
- Black businesses have been supported with over \$4.3 million dollars spent and over 7000 black businesses supported
- Nearly 58,000 students have been exposed to the arts through the Salute to the Harlem Renaissance and Black Arts Movement
- The pillow case dress and shirt project has yielded 31,762 pillow case dresses and 5,125 pillow case shirts to date.
- Over 124,000 pairs of shoes and over 29,000 pairs of eye glasses have been collected

The superwoman phenom is getting us through on one side and killing us on the other side. We need to go to God in prayer to turn things around.
 - We need to pray like David did in the cave (Psalm 142) "I pour out before him my complaint; before him I tell my trouble."
 - No matter what you're going through God has put you in the right place and the right time. Grow in your relationship with him, have a little talk with Jesus and he will make everything alright
 - Women coming together in corporate prayer will strengthen your life. Trust the women God surrounded you in this Sorority to help you get through this life.
 - Life will bring us hills and valleys but there is always somebody that God has
 fixed their heart to help you and care about you. Get you a "success entourage".
 God will put people in your life to make it through the weak days cards, calls,
 texts will give you the hope needed to make it through.
 - God left the flock of 99 sheep to find the 1 lost sheep. There is nothing that we
 can do to make God give up on us. God specializes in doing it again and again
 and again. Everything is working together for the good of God to restore and
 reconcile the soul of his people.

Closing Remarks by Mrs. Carolyn G. Randolph

- Soror Carolyn G. Randolph opened the second Plenary Session discussing the importance of "Refilling our Glass". She stated some see their glass half full and some see their glass half empty but we all must refill our glass.
- Soror Jennifer King Congleton, Mid Atlantic Regional Director, provided the meditation. She began the meditation by stating "Great is Thy Faithfulness". Soror Congleton stated God is faithful and has compassion for all of us. She further stated Covid has humbled us, and it does not discriminate. She emphasized the importance of putting our hope in God and tomorrow in God's promise. She referenced 1 Timothy 6:17 which reads: "Charge them that are rich in this world, that they be not high-minded, nor trust in uncertain riches, but in the living God, who giveth us richly all things to enjoy;"
- Gamma Theta Omega Choir graced us with a selection "Jesus Will."
- Introduction of the Supreme Basileus by Soror Sarah Louis
 (University of Florida), Undergraduate Co-Chairman SARC.
 Soror Louis gave an overview of Soror Glenda Glovers credentials
 starting with receiving her BS Degree in Mathematics from
 Tennessee State University, MBA in Accounting from Clark Atlanta
 University, PHD of Philosophy and Business Degree from George
 Washington University and a Juris Doctor Degree from Georgetown
 University Law Center.

Soror Glover started her State of the Sorority message by quoting Hebrews 11:3 which reads:

"Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen."

Soror Glover thanked the SAR for their commitment, vision, and service. She stated SAR demonstrated immeasurable faith and commended our Region for how we responded to the Covid crises.

Soror Glover had a moment of silence for those we have lost because of Covid.

Soror Glover discussed the defining moment for our nation when Soror Kamala Harris became Vice President of the United States. She further stated it was the vision, faith, hope of our founders who kept the faith that helped us get to this point in history.

Soror Glover thanked SAR for implementing the 5 Program Targets and enhancing the program brands. A video was shown reviewing the 5 Program Targets highlighting accomplishments such as 1 million dollars collected in one day for HBCU, 1.5 million women reached through Breast Cancer Awareness initiative, 157,000 miles on Mammogram Mobile Unit, 101 mammograms completed in Atlanta, Ga., 3300 AKA Assist Programs, over 4000 AKA Owned Businesses, 146,000 high school students exposed to Harlem Renaissance, 148,000 eyeglasses donated, 100,958 pillowcase dresses donated, 554,958 shoes donated. 8334 reactivated Sorors.1255 new Sorors welcomed into AKA during Covid. The Connection Committee encouraged voter registration and helped to mobilize 141 million voters.

Soror Glover stated we walk by faith and not by sight. She stated SAR has kept the faith and will sustain this great sisterhood.

The International Committee Reports were next on the agenda. Soror Jasmyne McCoy, 2nd Supreme Anti Basileus kicked off this session as she delivered the Undergraduate Report.

The next topic of discussion was reviewing the Bylaw changes.

The results of the Financial audit were reviewed. We received a high opinion from the CPA firm and had no outstanding liabilities. Our total assets as of 12-31-2020 was \$19,013,684.00. Our balance sheets remain healthy.

Soror Joy Elaine Daily, Chairperson of Covid19 Task Force stated on March 21, 2020 the sorority developed and committed to a plan

for sorority activities in a virtual environment. A video was shown showing the work of this committee. It was discussed how social media networks were leveraged to communicate and showcase our initiatives. We had over 1000 confirmed Covid cases, 22 Undergraduate, and 42 Ivies Beyond the Wall because of Covid.

Soror Darice Richard, South Atlantic Regional Coordinator of EAF discussed EAF fundraising activities such as the scarf sales. She discussed how EAF moved to remote in March and had their first virtual brunch with 2000 virtual attendees in Sept 2020.

Soror Andrea Daniels, South Atlantic Region Representative discuss our Program Targets. Caregivers Day had over 1900 activities. The CAP Program's total enrollment was 15,000 versus a goal of 50,000. Covid was the determining factor in not meeting this goal in 2020. Credit Repair, Identity Protection, Home Buying webinars with Regions Bank were some of the virtual events in 2020 for Target 3. The Arts had 270,000 volunteer hours. Global Impact Day helps to improve the quality of life for person across the globe. This initiative assisted 180,000 refugees.

The Plenary ended with Program Award Presentations by Soror Marquita Grant, South Atlantic Region Award Chairperson. I was proud to hear Lambda Epsilon Omega received a 1st Place award for Arts & Crafts.

The workshop I attended was "How to Get Everything You Deserve in Life." Dr. Stephanie Barnes was the guest speaker. She was introduced by Soror Maria Newton. Her bio included a Law Degree from Harvard, a practicing Attorney of Law over 20 years, and a bestselling author.

Dr. Barnes started out by saying our lives are not perfect. Embrace disruptions and do not let these things define our lives. Disruptions are opportunities for elevation.

Dr. Barnes discussed disruptions due to the pandemic. She used the example of Netflix vs Blockbuster. Blockbuster was an in-store business, but Netflix was electronic, livestreaming. She stated we want our lives to imitate Netflix with new opportunities. We should not let adversity keep us from what we desire. Adversity guards the door to success. She emphasized the importance of getting what you desire. We are the one that stands in our way due to fear of failure, self-doubt, procrastination, and being overwhelmed. We put ourselves in a box. We need to live in the AND. "I don't have to sacrifice myself. I can have it all."

Dr. Barnes stated the ways to recognize the greatness in you and get everything you deserve in life you must:

Surrender – open yourself up to the possibilities in life. Realize yourself from the belief the strong do not break. We are women of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, but we are not meant to carry the weight of the world on our shoulders. Because our lives are not going the way we planned does not mean we are a failure, but we must submit to our AND. We must surrender ALL. God provides for ALL. Pray to receive all the blessings God has for you. Do not limit yourself. Surrender the self you are and embrace the self you were meant to be. We are not the way we are but the way we believe. ALL THINGS ARE POSSIBLE.

Be Mindful - Our mindset defines everything.

Create Vision - Create vision in line with your purpose in life.

You must Decide – Backup your thoughts and beliefs with your decisions. Cut off all that takes you backward instead of forward.

Cut off negativity and all people and things that keep you from getting what you deserve. We must make decisions. Decide to be in perfect peace. We can have perfect peace in the mist of our mess because we know God has us. Get out of your own way. Stop living by default and live on purpose. 99% of women spend their lives on what they are supposed to do and 1% on what you desire to do. STOP SETTLING. Be mindful and deliberate. You will not have your best life until you decide to go get it. Make a commitment to be the highest and best version of yourself. You deserve nothing less, embrace it and love in it.

Be Deliberate. Say every morning, "I deserve everything I desire in life." Sometimes you win by losing. An example is Stacy Abrams. Sometimes we lose the race but not the purpose.

Are we character driven, or emotion driven?

Soror White ended by stating we need good leaders and good followers to survive. We are all a part of this great Sorority. We all are important to Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority.

As I close out my Delegate report, I would like to say it was an honor and a privilege to be selected as a delegate. It was a rewarding experience and I hope to be considered again in the future to serve.
