Plenary II was called to order by Madam Regional Director, Soror Carolyn G. Randolph, at 3:20pm. Meditation was delivered followed by a solo and introduction of the Supreme Baslieus. Madam Supreme, Soror Glenda Baskin Glover, provided The State of the Sorority report, of which highlights include: The Sorority boasts 110,778 active members and 1045 chapters (24% growth); property of Soror Ehtel Hedgemon Lyle was purchased for restoration and transition into "The Ethel Hedgemon Lyle Museum for Women Achievement" (\$300,00 for museum raised in one day); 175,000 students applied to college under #CAP and 14,000 students were admitted to college; \$2.5 million raised for HBCUs in one day; the Mississippi Health Project returned to the Delta area; the Mammogram Bus traveled 184,033 miles; 21 cities visited to provide Covid-19 support; over 500 million shoes collected and 1,310,619 refugees supported; \$60 million spent with Black businesses; and 645,101 students exposed to the Arts.

South Atlantic Regional representatives provided reports in the following areas: Programs, EAF, MIP, and Disaster Relief. Highlights from these reports are as follows: all Program targets were exceeded in under two years; EAF boasts assets in the amount of \$27 million and Lambda Epsilon Omega once again achieved Platinum status; through the modified MIP process, 6,472 new members were initiated in Spring 2021 and 6,581 new members were

initiated in Fall 2021; the Sorority supported 13 disaster events in the SAR (including assistance with the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic prior to the creation of the Covid-19 Task Force) and \$170,100 disbursed by February 2022. Speeches were delivered from each candidate for South Atlantic Region Director: Soror Silvia Blackmon Roberts, Soror Tiffany Moore Russell, and Soror Dianne Williams Cox. Plenary II ended with the Registration Report update (total Sorors registered/checked in was 1,154) and the Tellers Report, which provided Delegates with instructions on how to utilize the electronic election voting system (first time use at the SARC); Lambda Epsilon Omega and the other Cluster V Chapters were designated to vote on Saturday, April 16, 2022 from 10am until 12pm in the Kenyan Suite of the Georgia International Convention Center.

The budget for the sorority is based on its fiscal year – January 1 through December 31. After review of
recent revenue and expense trends, the International Finance Committee has developed
recommendations for the 2023 and 2024 General Fund operating budget for approval at the 70 th Boule
in Orlando, Florida. The International Finance Committee is not recommending any increases in per
capita, for undergraduate, graduate, or general members. Also, there are no proposed increases in
membership intake fees, chapter taxes, chapter charter fees or COIP assessments.

Overview of Key Components of the 2023 / 2024 Budget

REVENUES 2023 and 2024

Revenues for the general fund are composed of the following five categories. The specific amount budgeted for each category is shown on the enclosed spreadsheet.

Membership Dues

This category is comprised of per capita tax receipts for graduate, undergraduate and general members; late fees; and membership intake process fees. The projected membership for 2022 was the basis for the 2023 and 2024 projections. Given the phenomenal growth in membership in 2021 and 2022, a conservative approach was taken for the budgeted amounts for 2023 and 2024.

Chapter Fees

The budget for chapter fees was based on a total of 394 undergraduate chapters in 2022 and 615 graduate chapters in 2022, with an allowance for growth based on the number of interest groups that are currently in place. Inactive chapters are not included in this budget category.

Sales

The sales portion of the revenue budget relates to fees associated with the publication of the *Ivy Leaf*® Magazine, sale of documents such as the *Constitution and Bylaws* and *Manual of Standard Procedure*, sale of history books, and the sale of sorority badges. Vendor fees represent fees paid to the Corporate Office to become authorized vendors.

A significant increase in the sale of sorority documents is due to the beginning of a new administration. The sale of sorority badges is projected to decrease in keeping with the conservative approach previously mentioned for the projected number of new sorors.

International Programs

These revenues support our international programs. Also included in this category are projected corporate partners' contributions.

Other Income

Other income includes interest, rent from the Educational Advancement Foundation, COIP fees from candidates for membership, and revenues paid to the corporate office by regions for accounting services. Cornerstone Background Check represents funds received for background checks that are a part of the prospective members' application process.

EXPENDITURES 2023 and 2024

Expenditures for the General Fund are comprised of the following seven categories; The specific amount budgeted for each category is shown on the attached spreadsheet.

Directorate/Committees

Directorate and Committee expenses represent the cost of Directorate meetings, officers' expense, and international committees' expenditures. Directorate meetings are held three times a year. Each officer and regional director is given a quarterly expense check to help defray costs of operating their office. Committee expenses include the cost of an annual "mass committee meetings" where most committees meet simultaneously on the same weekend.

Publications

Publications consist of the printing of the *Ivy Leaf*® Magazine, which is published quarterly in color, and the sorority history book. Document printing is also in this category and covers printing various sorority documents such as the Fiscal Fitness Guide, Protocol Guide, Rituals Handbook, etc.

Corporate Office

Salaries and Benefits include salaries, benefits and pension costs for the staff. Ongoing technology upgrades are planned over the next three years.

COIP

COIP, Corporate Office Improvement Plan, is the expense to support maintenance of the Corporate Office. This category includes office maintenance, insurance, real estate taxes, and utilities. A portion of the fees collected from each candidate for membership is used to fund this category.

International Programs

The International Program category includes expense for the international program of the Supreme Basileus, Leadership Fellows, Public Policy Forum, and the Congressional Black Caucus. Donations and dues include donations to program organizations that are in keeping with initiatives supported by the sorority. The capital campaign is invested to support unanticipated operating general expenses.

Taxes/Insurance

The surety bond covers all Directorate members and staff. General Liability Insurance includes Directors' and Officers' insurance and other general liability areas. The special fund represents funds set aside for litigation expenses.

Other

Other includes Public Relations, Courtesies/Benevolence, Audit/Tax, Legal fees, Professional Services, and Miscellaneous. The Housing transfer represents \$1 collected from per capita tax that goes to the Housing Foundation. The Boule transfer is the five dollars (\$5.00) that is collected from per capita tax and allocated to the Boule fund to support Boule hostess chapters. Unrelated business income (UBI) tax represents taxes paid to the Internal Revenue Service for unrelated business income.

PURPOSE OF THE WORKSHOP

To assist leaders and chapter members in understanding and exercising their oversight and fiduciary responsibility for the organization's finances and effective financial operation.

OBJECTIVES

- Understand the importance of a Chapter's Financial Fundamentals
- Discuss how to be efficient in the planning, handling, and reporting of chapter's finances
- Review responsibilities of chapter's financial officers

CHAPTER RESPONSIBILITY



- Fiscal Fitness Guide for Chapter Financial Operations has been updated, the most current revision is dated November 2018
- This is an essential document to ensure your chapter is following the correct financial procedures

FISCAL YEAR

- Alpha Kappa Alpha's fiscal year begins January 1st and ends December 31steach year
- Financial cards are valid for the fiscal year

CHAPTER FINANCIAL OFFICERS

- Pecunious Grammateus (Financial Secretary)
- Tamiouchos (Treasurer)

Control Objective –Separation of duties between the receipt and disbursement of funds.

CHAPTER BUDGET

- It is the duty of the Budget and Finance Committee to develop the chapter's budget for the fiscal year.
- The Tamiouchos serves as the Committee Chairman
- The Pecunious Grammateus, Anti-Pecunious Grammateus and the Anti-Tamiouchos should be members of the Budget and Finance Committee

FINANCIAL OFFICER RESPONSIBILITIES

Pecunious Grammateus

- Receives and records all monies for the chapter
- Gives receipts for all income received and maintains duplicates of all receipts in a receipt book
- Submits all funds received to the Tamiouchos within 5-7 business days
- Must maintain a Cash Receipts Report and/or Cash Receipts Journal.
- Maintains current alphabetical list of all financial members
- Maintains current record of funds submitted to the Tamiouchos
- Keeps a record of all payments made by each soror and brings the record to chapter meetings

FINANCIAL OFFICER RESPONSIBILITIES

Tamiouchos

- Serves as guardian of the chapter's funds
- Receives all funds from the Pecunious Grammateus
- Keeps an orderly record of income and expenditures
- Maintains the chapter's Cash Disbursement Journal
- Makes deposits of all funds received within 5 7 business days of receipt from the Pecunious Grammateus
- Issues checks upon receipt of properly executed vouchers
- Issues a check signed by 2 authorized chapter officers
- Reconciles bank statements monthly

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FINANCIAL OFFICER RESPONSIBILITIES

Tamiouchos, continued

- Make monthly written financial reports to the chapter
- Keeps separate records and lists associated with special funds and/or bank accounts
- Prepares annual report to include funds received, expended and current state of chapter finances
- Prepares annual budget for presentation to the chapter prior to the meeting in November of each year
- Maintains the checkbook
- Invoices or supporting papers should be attached to a voucher to substantiate payment

AUDITS

An internal audit:

- Provides the chapter with information that is useful in measuring compliance with the sorority and chapter policies and procedures.
- Provides an assessment of the fairness of the presentation on the chapter financial statements and the adequacy with which operational procedures have been followed.
- Provides a report on the completeness and integrity of the chapter financial records.

AUDITS, continued

An internal audit:

- The financial records of a chapter must be audited internally on an annual basis, and a written report made to the chapter. The Basileus appoints the Audit Committee
- It is recommended that an external audit by a non chapter member(s) be performed at the end of the Tamiouchos' term of office or on other occasions deemed necessary.
- The internal audit function should not include the Tamiouchos, Pecunious Grammateus or any other officer involved in the receipt and/or disbursements of funds for the audit period.

The session presented international and regional committee reports. The sorority is in good financial shape, therefore the proposed budget will have no increased fees per capita tax, chapter, or charter tax. An audit was conducted in the Fall 2021 which revealed an unmodified clean opinion audit (the highest opnion). All chapters financial reports were filed on time. The audit revealed that the sorority is in good standing with limited liabilities. The South Atlantic Region revenue was \$2,724,508.47 from January 1-December 31, 2021.Beginning balance of \$761,040.31. Total regional revenue \$903,391.35 leaving a balance of \$2,582,157.43. The remaining balance includes the assessments paid by Cluster 5 for the 69th SARC. This balance does not include the projected expenses for the 69th SARC of \$2 million, the registration refunds of \$280,557 and it does not include the upcoming Boule expenses. Membership has increased resulting in 30,000 newly reactivated sorors as a resut of the toolkit used by the Madam Supreme. The pandemic taskforce reported an update on the risk mitagation plan, 93% of sorors are vaccinated and 80% of members feel comfortable returning to in-person meetings. A survey will be sent out soon concerning

A zoom meeting will be scheduled for more one-on-one training to help chapters with technology.
